
15 MARCH 2022: United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) declared 2026 as International Year of Rangelands & Pastoralists




- Movement grew since 2008 into global coalition of over 300 pastoralist & supporting organisations, including International Livestock Research Institute (ILRI) & several UN agencies
- Building on these efforts, Government of Mongolia proposed resolution to UNGA in 2019, supported by over 100 countries
- Approved unanimously by UNGA in 2022
- FAO to facilitate implementation of IYRP 2026




Why an IYRP?



- To reveal critical contributions of rangelands
 & pastoralists for food security, economy,
 ecosystem services, climate resilience & culture
- To promote informed, science-based policy & legislation for current & future generations
- To mobilise people worldwide to grasp new opportunities in rangelands & pastoralism
- To increase sustainable and ethical investment in rangelands & pastoralist livelihoods




What are rangelands? Who are pastoralists?



Significance of rangelands & pastoralism

- ◆ Rangelands cover over half of the Earth's land –
 yet most endangered & least protected ecosystem
- ◆ They support livelihoods of 500 million people plus another 2 billion people along value chains.
- ◆ Pastoralists use livestock to convert short-lived vegetation that cannot be consumed by humans into food rich in nutrients and high-value protein.






Yet they are ignored or underestimated

- ◆ Pastoralists are dispossessed of their traditional pastures & their migration routes are blocked.
- ◆ This disrupts their herd movements to make optimal use of land & endangers their continued contribution to nutrition & food security.
- ◆ Little awareness of pastoralists' & rangeland's vital role in maintaining biodiversity & providing ecosystem services, e.g. carbon sequestration:
 - Carbon sinks can be significant in rangelands.
 - Rangelands are global biodiversity hotspots & habitats for numerous endangered species while being grazed by livestock & wildlife.


