Over the past fourteen years, UR-SAPHA scientists have extensively studied pastoral and agro-pastoral livelihoods from disciplinary, multi-disciplinary and trans-disciplinary perspectives. Our research projects include:

We have particularly understood that climate change, rapid demographic growth, agricultural extensification, land grabbing and insecurity of land tenure and rights are major challenges for pastoralism. However, in the face of all these challenges, pastoralists remain innovative and develop various relevant strategies to sustainably manage rangelands and keep their livelihoods viable. We believe they need more support to preserve their indigenous land management practices, protect the environment, and participate more sustainably in secure food production and development. Facilitating cross-border mobility remains a critical issue in the West Africa and Sahel space and support to pastoralists will help safeguard pastoral livelihoods and sustainable land management.

UR-SAPHA therefore fully supports the Government of Mongolia's IYRP request in order to actively contribute to promoting the values and strengths of pastoralist production patterns on secure rangelands for food security, peaceful co-existence between livelihoods and communities and sustainable livestock production. We look forward to participating in all awareness, advocacy and lobbying initiatives to promote pastoralism and sustainable rangeland management. Our young and dynamic team is available to carry out activities at local, national and regional levels in West and Central Africa to achieve the objectives of the IYRP.
